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OPHSA19TH ANNUAL REUNION

An Interview with Glenn Palmedo-Smith

QUESTION

Glenn, how did you get into the film making business?

ANSWER

In 1975, I earned a BS degree in Telecommunications and Film at SDSU, and have since completed a handful of documentaries, a 35mm motion picture, (*The Hungry Woman*), along with dozens of biographies & tribute



videos for clients, as well as having a book published by Crown Publishing, *Discovering Ellis Ruley*. I'm now honored to add this latest contrasting subject to my career; a film about the military with the realization it would not merely be about the war, but rather something much more insightful.



As a survivor of OP Harry and a man committed to its story being told, **Mr. Baker** afforded me seemingly unlimited expenses and unprecedented access to a bevy of interview participants, which have included: three US Generals, one South Korean General, two MASH nurses, one CCF, (Chinese Communist Forces), nurse, twenty-five US veterans,

six former CCF combatants, two military historians, the Veteran's Committee chairman of Korea's National Assembly, three notable US politicians, two national veteran advocates, three Greek Spartan veterans, two KATUSA's, an MIA relative, a KIA family member and the Prime Minister of South Korea.

Today, nearly two years later, the filming is at last complete and only the final editing remains. As Director, I can further state that I am a different filmmaker today.

QUESTION

What are your goals for this film?

Answer

The film's goals are:

 South Korea's success provides positive resolution for the veteran sacrifices depicted in our film. The film's core message to today's returning service members is, "You too – who've been wounded, mentally affected or just considered damaged goods by an often ungrateful

- and unsympathetic society -- can also find peace, enjoy raising a family and experience business success, just as these young-at-heart folks have!" Fruits of sacrifice, sometimes are to be savored, and often only evident, nearly sixty years later...
- 2. Conversely, for those who assume this effort is therefore some kind of "military documentary", they may be disappointed. I make films and write books about people who find themselves in extraordinary circumstances and that is exactly what this film is; a decisive battle at the end of the Korean War. A unique human experience-singular in modern warfare, (at least since WWI), where two principal players, the US and China, simply "had it out" face-to-face in trench warfare, just before going to the bargaining table to sign an armistice. One side was committed to "Hold At All Costs", the other to "Take at All Costs".

This battle included two of the greatest fears held by mankind, (far worse than any Frankenstein or King Kong monster). These are:

- 1. The ancient nightmare of enemy hordes attacking while you sleep, and
- 2. The equal horror of the past century, nightly "shock and awe" heavy artillery barrages.

No, this film is not a war film, it's about what human beings are capable of doing to each other, what they can endure, how the species can adapt and how these very same people can go forth, return home, get married, have children, build careers and enjoy fruitful lives.

For some however, when left alone, in their deepest sleep, these soldier's' horrible nightmares are only a wink away. And now, unforeseeable, after intimately reliving these troubled images with these men and women, their experiences have now somehow burrowed into my own psyche, and are soon to be transplanted within the country's larger consciousness. How can one person be asked to document such horrific events and expect not to be affected? Those who converse with me regularly know that I can barely tell an OP Harry tale without choking up. I'm a changed person and I've been affected by the making of this film. As the men and women I've interviewed have suffered in sharing their memories, I'm compelled now to share with the world these same experiences and hopefully, somehow, rid myself of the curse -- or is it an honor? I know viscerally it's the latter.

QUESTION

Can you describe the process of filming the interviews?

ANSWER

Upon arrival at each veteran's abode, my crew and I typically were led to the veteran's den. Almost without exception, there existed a wall full of medals, ribbons, patches and photos of buddies -- all captured in lose fitting military fatigues and goofy faces belying their circumstances -- with nearly always a shadow-box frame containing a six-inch

piece of rusted barbed-wire from the DMZ. It mattered not whether I was in a MASH nurse's home, a veteran's abode in Peoria, Illinois, in Greece or in a tiny apartment in Communist China -- eerily, they all had the same dedicated wall space, located somewhere in their home where the veteran spent most of his or her time.

I was raised in the San Francisco Bay Area suburbs with fellow sons and daughters of WWII vets and many of my older buddies whom I befriended later in college, often veterans of the Viet Nam War, all had some evidence of military ephemera. However, I can't recall one veteran I knew back then who possessed a wall entirely dedicated to his or her time served in the service. To be sure, every soldier had, or has, a cigar box stuffed with military momentous that can be retrieved from time to time, and then safely, sanely, returned to a special shelf behind sweaters. The few homes I later visited of the rare OPHSA veteran who participated on the periphery of Harry, as part of a support team, seemed not to be afflicted with the "decorated wall" syndrome. Yet, they too, were no less heros in my book for their service.

I'd surmise much later it was the specific experience of facing death in hand-to-hand combat, that evidently cemented this internationally common bond among those who had been there; like some weird unintended initiation club. No matter what race, creed, color, ethnicity, nationality or sex, these people shared something very profound, many without having ever met. Yes, something quite unique happened to these people up there, on that dreadfully bloody mountain.

I'm reminded of the beautiful Chinese nurse, **Fu Feng**, who at only thirteen years of age, while carrying a loaded burp gun nearly half her weight, often performed nightly patrol duty around Harry from the adjacent mountain, Star Hill -- while her American male counterpart also on patrol was only a few dozen yards away. Fu Feng described to our camera how she learned the unique skill of patching a human's split-

skull back together with an oddly shaped and filthy military shirt, utilizing buttons, after half the brains had been spilled out.

Or, American **Jim Evans**, describing how he quickly learned not to step on oozing guts of combatants, thus to avoid slipping, while ducking and weaving speedily through once seven-foot deep, but now shallow, two-foot deep trenches above an endlessly-long stack of human carnage.



Or, the brave Greek Spartan, **Demitrios Popadoupolos**, who on the seventh day of the battle was ordered to re-dig the pulverized and collapsed trenches at Harry. After spraying aerosol foot deodorant up his nose to quell the stench of death, while exposing various decaying body parts with his shovel, he



described his significant joy at coming across a rare dirtencrusted American football. Only after gleefully passing it around to his comrades did he discover the blasted orb was merely a clump of solidified blood.

My interviews frequently started with a wife or son desiring to be present during the process. "He never talks about the war; can I listen in?" was often heard, even from oldest daughters near my own age, (I was born a government brat in D.C. right smack in the middle of the Korean War).

"I'm sorry, we have to ask that you wait in another room," would typically be my answer; always using the term, "we"," as in crew, to better assuage my negative responsibility. I had learned early on that if veterans hadn't talked much to their families about these intimate matters in the past, they sure weren't about to start nearly sixty years later.

CONCLUSION

The moment after the "World Premiere" screening of what we believe will be an amazing film, to be shown in San Diego at the next OPHSA reunion, I will look forward to seeing all of you again and, in particular, **Mr. Baker**, who is simply the most genuinely generous person I've ever met; shake his hand, and give him my heartfelt thanks for honoring me to take the helm of this project and allowing me to be the Director of this story for the past two years.

And finally, I can say to all of you folks, it has been a distinct honor and a unique privilege to represent the entire OPHSA organization on this project. You're quite frankly the best damn people I believe I've ever had the great privilege to know. Thank you from the bottom of my heart and please accept an even deeper THANK YOU, from what I believe will be a very grateful nation...




Send no money with your order. When the order is complete Floyd will ship it to you with an itemized invoice for payment.
