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OPHSA REUNION INFORMATION

Reunion planning is progressing. We are a little over three months away. Here is the information we have at this time.

The date is **June 16 to June 19.**

The location is the **Boston-Brookline Holiday Inn** located at 1200 Beacon Street in Brookline, MA.

The hotel room rate is \$110 single or double per night. Suites, Triple rooms and Quad accommodations are not available.

All rates are subject to a 9.7% Massachusetts Sales Tax.

Individual overnight parking is \$15.00

It is not too early to make your hotel reservations. The local number at the hotel is **(617) 277-1200**. When making reservations at the hotel by phone be sure to mention the OP Harry Survivors Association to ensure you are getting the negotiated group rate.

For those who wish to book their room on line www.bos-brookline.holiday-inn.com is the address. On the reservation form use the Group Booking Code 'OHS'.

Reservations made after May 17, 2005 are on a room availability basis. 40 rooms have been reserved for the Association and are held for us until that date. It is best to make your reservation before May 17.



PIPELINE TO KOREA

My trip [in the pipeline] began at Camp Stoneman, Ca. We were given a priority 1A as FOs were badly needed in Korea (Now I know why)



We were set to go 1 day and then a bunch of paratroopers came in and they were given priority 1A1. We were delayed a few more days.

Early one morning we were jarred awake, loaded on buses, taken to Travis Air Force Base and put on a Northwest Orient DC 4 (complete with stewardesses). Had a 12 hour flight to Hawaii to refuel, another 12 hour flight to Wake Island, and our final 12 hour flight to Tokyo (flying hours)

We were bused to Camp Drake (I asked the bus driver why so many had gauze masks over their mouth and noses – said that was their time of the month – so much for stupid questions)

Since I had a low date of rank, I was assigned with several others to inventory PXs in the area. I have forgotten the name of the small camp north of Camp Drake that I was to inventory. When I went down to get my paper work, I asked for directions and was told, all I had to do was to go down to the Motor Pool, check out a jeep and driver and he would know.

As we were driving out of the main gate and onto that busy street, the driver turned to me and said, “Which way, Sir” Then he told me he had just gotten there the day before.

We took off, headed north and wound around the area, stopping and asking directions from anyone we felt could speak English. After about 2 to 3 hours, we finally found the place.

Then, I was sent for CBR Warfare training at Etta Jima for 2 weeks. After that we were loaded on a narrow gauge train and went to Sasebo.

From there we had an overnight cruise to Pusan where we were met by an Army band, playing, “If I Known you were coming I’d A Baked a Cake” (Very funny)

There we were loaded on 6X6s open trucks and hauled to the Repo Depot. All along the way, the people were giving us the finger.

I was assigned to the 3rd Div and then loaded onto the “Pusan Express”.



This train had most of its windows broken out and the door between the cars was missing.

It was miserably cold for our all night ride to Seoul sitting on those wooden seats.

I was picked as Car Commander of our car and each time the train stopped, I had to post 4 guards outside on the 4 corners of our car.

We arrived at Seoul the next morning and given a briefing of what was ahead. The next afternoon, we were again loaded on a rickety train for another miserable night. Arriving at the 3rd Division rear where we met Major John Eisenhower, the G2. He told us not to worry about hearing the men “bitch”, but when they weren’t – we had better start worrying.

From there we were shipped to the 39th FA Bn during the night for our assignments and given more equipment.

I was assigned to C Bty and met my Battery Commander, Capt. Bray and then got acquainted with my FO crew.

A few days later, I was sent forward to join K Company and met the CO Lt Markley and the XO Lt Richards on OP Dick. I really felt that I had finally found a home as both men were so helpful in getting me acquainted and making me feel a part of the team. Markley was all business and Rich was always up to something. Markley was the kind of leader who wouldn't ask anyone to do anything that he wouldn't do.

Several weeks later, K Co was taken off the line and I went back to my Battery for a short time before I rejoined K Co to occupy OP Harry.

MORE PIPELINE AND AFTER

*We asked for some input from members about their adventures while in the "Pipeline". We have received much material to share. **Ray Scherrman** sent an email with information about his trip through that famous "pipe" which he observed was very similar to others already sent in. He sent several pictures that reminded us about the groups of men who kept the paperwork and supplies moving. Napoleon observed that an Army moved on it's stomach, but who were the guys in Korea who moved the men and supplies, the food and fuel, ammo, all that paperwork and the mail? Because we agree with Ray about his time in the pipeline being typical we want to tell you, in his own words, about what he did after the pipeline spit him out into the 5th RCT.* (Ed)

In August of 1952 I reported to Camp Stoneman, CA. Upon reporting there I was notified that I was on a Congressional Tag Hold due to the illness of my father. I was sent to detachment E, Co. H. There was a need for a clerk typist and I was assigned to that duty. I spent the next months typing reports, working with soldiers that were on hold, AWOL and loading soldiers on boats at Alameda shipyards and Fort Mason. In March of 1953 I got orders to go to Korea and boarded a ship at Alameda.



I spent my time on the boat in the cabin typing the ship's daily log. This was nice duty, as I was able to eat and sleep with the ship's crew.

When we left California we found we were assigned to the 2nd Division. While on the ship our orders were changed and we were assigned to a Regimental Combat Team.

After getting all our combat gear at Camp Drake in Japan, we loaded on a boat for Korea and landed at Inchon. The tide was out so we had to crawl down ropes on the side of the boat to get to the LST and then to the shore where there was a junky old passenger train waiting to take us North to a rail center.

We unloaded from the train and onto trucks that took us to the Heavy Mortar Section of the 5th RCT at the Punchbowl.

We were interviewed in a bunker by a SFC who was getting information about what we did in the States. When I told him I was a "Remington Raider" I was abruptly told there was not a job for a typist in Korea. I was asked if I could drive a truck and I said yes.

I was sent to the motor pool where my classification was a transportation Corporal.

I hauled ammunition, meals and troops up to the front lines. I found out very soon that I was in the heat of the War, not in the easy place of typing orders.

I got shot at many times but was lucky enough to have the rounds miss my truck. I was very happy to have the shooting stop when the truce was signed.

Ray was one of the many support troops who provided the supplies, food and ammo while sticking their necks out on those washboards the Koreans used for roads. The more I hear the stories of our OPHSA members who performed the services needed to keep the frontline troops supplied the more I appreciate the value of the work they did and the risks they took in

performance of their duty. Truly it was everyone who contributed that made it possible for us to say today: "WE HELD" (Ed)
